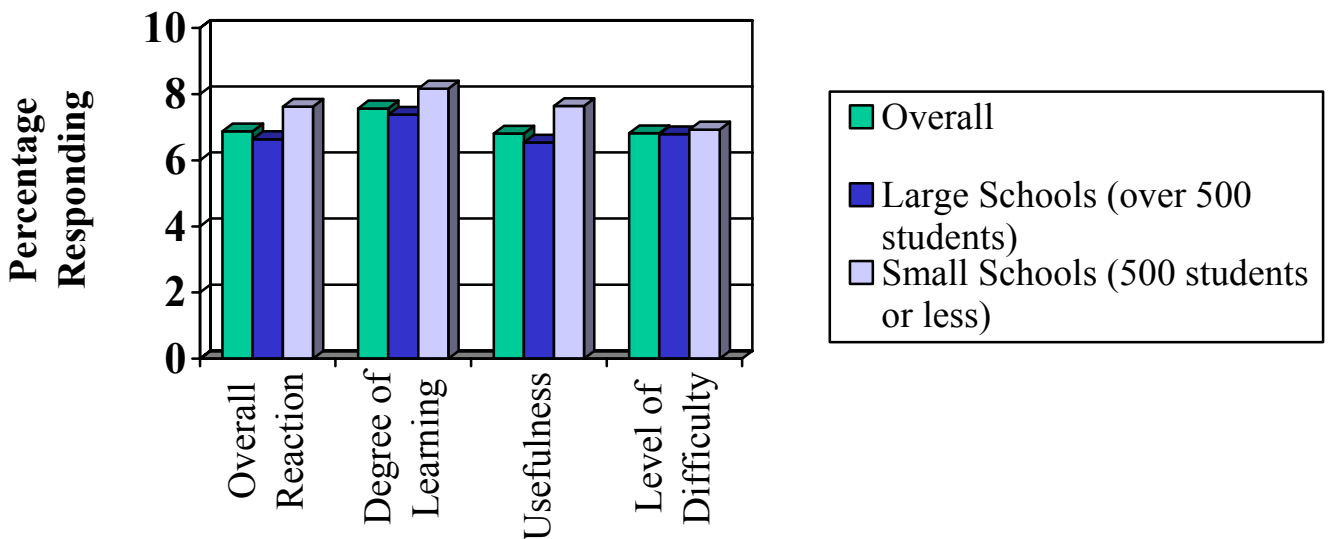


Senior Project Stakeholder Satisfaction Survey, 1998 and 1999

SERVE's initial Senior Project study sought to determine the degree of satisfaction with the Senior Project program. SERVE administered surveys to students, faculty members, parents, and Senior Project coordinators at 16 established southeastern Senior Project sites in spring 1998 and spring 1999. Each year approximately 1,800 students, 180 parents, 170 faculty members, and 16 Senior Project coordinators were surveyed.

Stakeholder Satisfaction with Senior Project



Overall Reaction ranged from very negative (1) to very positive (10). **Degree of Learning** ranged from learned very little (1) to learned a lot (10). **Usefulness** ranged from useless, boring (1) to very rewarding, challenging (10). **Level of Difficulty** ranged from too easy (1) to too hard (10).

In 1998, 23% of students recommended no changes to Senior Project, 55% said some changes were needed, and 22% stated that the program should be discontinued. In 1999, 40% of students believed no changes should be made, 37% thought some changes should be made, and 23% said it should be discontinued. In 1999, 75% of students strongly agreed that their writing, speaking, research, planning, and time management skills had improved as a result of Senior Project participation. The degree of agreement was even higher—over 80%—for Senior Project coordinators and parents.
